Barbie campaign gets message to more mates

Adelaide, the Big Aussie Barbie campaign was launched with a giant splash at the Metropolitan Fire Service headquarters in Wakefield St, Adelaide, on Friday, August 30. While the first big barbie of the prostate cancer awareness season was sizzling out the front of the fire station, an outside broadcast 891 ABC Adelaide's of Mornings with Ian Henschke also entertained a large crowd gathered in the MFS forecourt.

broadcast The featured prostate interviews about cancer from doctors and prostate cancer survivors, including Barossa winemaker Grant Burge and former SACA curator Les Burdett. We thank the participating organisations: major sponsor Commonwealth Metropolitan Bank, Fire Service, United Firefighters Union of SA and 891 ABC Adelaide.

Last year, more than 500 barbies were held across Australia for the PCFA campaign during September, raising more than \$800,000 for prostate cancer research, awareness and support programs. This year, twe are aiming even higher, hoping to collect \$1 million - and your help is needed to achieve this magical milestone.

Now in its fifth year, the Big Aussie Barbie is a chance for everyone to do something positive for men's health, by doing what Australians do best – hosting a fundraising barbie during September. It's a great way to catch up with friends and family, enjoy some lovely food and celebrate the men in our lives.

Dr Anthony Lowe, Chief Executive Officer of PCFA, says the Big Aussie Barbie campaign is all about encouraging Australians to



openly discuss prostate cancer, so that men are more aware of the health risks they face.

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Prostate Cancer Awareness Events

Awareness leads to more participation

Staging more prostate cancer awareness evenings is helping to boost the number of prostate cancer support groups.

S reported in the August news, the Henley/Fulham Awareness Evening was most successful with 60 attending. This prompted a follow-up evening on Thursday August 29 at the Henley Uniting Church, which saw robust discussion about inaugurating a new support group for Adelaide's western suburbs.

The Awareness evenings have proved to be a vital stimulus in creating new support groups – this time no doubt helped by strong presentations at the initial July 25 event by urologist Dr Kym Horsell, prostate cancer survivors Ian Fisk and Ray Power, and physiotherapist Sue Tulloch.

This meeting was supported by members of the Rotary Club of Charles Sturt/Grange with extensive promotion and advertising.

The Awareness Evening is an important opportunity for men and their partners to learn about prostate cancer – and many are very surprised that it affects one in every seven men up to the age of 75. PCFA policy is that men should talk to their doctor about checks from age 50, or 40 if they have a family history of prostate cancer.

The evening provides education and resources with accurate information about prostate cancer, and provides a chance to ask all speakers any questions of concern. Feedback from the evenings is always positive and most rewarding for those of us who organise the event.

Cancer Australia has been mapping the incidence of prostate cancer in South Australia over recent years, which has shown western suburbs figures to be marginally higher than other regions – hence PCFA's desire to start a new support group.

Prostate Cancer Support and Awareness: ADELAIDE GROUP

Making us mindful of many ways to focus and relax

The concept of Mindfulness was introduced as a method to help ease anxiety, as Adelaide Prostate Cancer Support Group's Ian Fisk reports.

T the July meeting of the Adelaide Prostate Cancer Support Group, our special guest speaker was Ian Richards, the Support Group and Outreach Coordinator for PCFA in South Australia and Northern Territory.

Ian started by telling our group about himself and how he came to become part of PCFA – much of it featured in an article on Ian in the June 2013 Prostate Supporter (Volume 6: Number 5).

There was a lot of discussion about various topics including the upcoming Ambassador training in Adelaide on September 24 and 25.

Ian also spoke to us in his counselling capacity about Mindfulness. Mindfulness is explained by online resource Wikipedia as "referring to a psychological quality that involves bringing one's complete attention to the present experience on a moment-to-moment basis. It involves paying attention in a particular way: on purpose, in the present moment, and nonjudgmentally.

"It can involve a kind of nonelaborative, non-judgmental, present-centered awareness in which each thought, feeling, or sensation that arises in the field of attention is acknowledged and accepted as it is."

Ian gave us a detailed PowerPoint presentation on the subject and many words. He explained that Mindfulness can be useful to help to relax, reduce anxiety, depression, stress, worries, reduce pain and reduce negative thoughts by focusing on the here and now.

We were also run through some exercises to help illustrate the Mindfulness concepts. We were told to focus on our breathing, we studied a photo of a morning glory flower and commented on details shown – and were given a sultana to feel, touch and taste – as examples of our ability to notice and explore by focusing and concentrating on detail.

In September, the Adelaide support group will join the Mitcham support group for its monthly meeting at the Colonel Light Gardens RSL Club, for a presentation by Dr Nick Brook, a consultant urologist and Director of Urological Cancer: Department of Urology at Royal Adelaide Hospital. 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Port Pirie Prostate Cancer Support Group

There's more to continence issues than you may suspect

An informative presentation about continence proved enlightening for Port Pirie Prostate Cancer Support Group members, as Richard Kruger reports.

ANY prostate cancer support _ groups have heard guest speakers talk about continence problems following prostate surgery - but because the Port Pirie group has a lot of new members who have not heard it all before, we asked Jenni Edwards, registered nurse of Port Pirie, to be our guest speaker. Interestingly, she told us quite a few things that we didn't know.

The basic advice for all men was to drink and eat well, get plenty of exercise, practice good toilet habits, and to try holding on longer before urinating to increase bladder capacity.

While the use of physical aids from pads, sheaths and catheters may only be required on a short term basis to help solve incontinence, long-term help devices – such as the

ultimate accessory, the inflatable cuff (which can also be used by females) – were explained.

While the continuing cost of using some of these products can be quite significant, eligible patients may be able to access the Continence Payment Scheme. Jenni told the group about the benefits of strengthening the pelvic floor muscle and presented a really good 3D concept of where the pelvic floor is located and what it does.

She also explained to us why a fit pelvic floor muscle can help so much with continence.

Port Pirie Prostate Cancer Support Group

Funding triumph brings vital cancer machinery to Port Pirie

Crucial lobbying work by members of the Port Pirie Prostate Cancer Support Group has resulted in an important new ultrasound machine being introduced to Port Pirie, as Richard Kruger reports.

THE Port Pirie Prostate Cancer Support Group was recently told by its convener Allan Manfield that funding has been found for a Mindray Ultrasound Machine, to be located at the Port Pirie Hospital. This wonderful development is due to the initiative of support group member John Rowe, who is also a member of Rotary, and with the support of local Rotary President Mario Valente, also a member of the support group.

The Mindray Ultrasound Machine is used in a procedure for ultrasoundguided prostate biopsies that are used to diagnose prostate cancer. The machine costs approximately \$12,000.

A prostate biopsy may be recommended by a doctor to check for cancer if other tests show there is a raised level of prostatespecific antigen (PSA) in the blood. This can be a sign of prostate cancer or other conditions, including inflammation of the prostate or an enlarged prostate gland. The procedure is known as a TRUS biopsy (transrectal ultrasound biopsy) of the prostate.

The procedure is routinely done in hospital as a day-stay (it means the patient can have this small procedure and go home the same day). It is performed under local anaesthetic, or local and some

sedation. The procedure usually takes less than 15 minutes.

The advantage of the Port Pirie hospital acquiring the new machine is that local patients – who had previously been put on a waiting list in Adelaide of several

months – can now have the procedure performed much sooner, without the delaying of a diagnosis. It is wonderful that this can now be done in Port Pirie, saving the time and trouble of travelling to Adelaide.

PCFA: A REMINDER ON PROSTATE CANCER TESTING

PCFA Policy on Testing Asymptomatic Men for Prostate Cancer.

• Emerging evidence on the benefits and potential harms of testing and subsequent treatment of asymptomatic men for prostate cancer has led many interested parties around the world to revise their guidance on testing using the PSA, or blood test, and Digital Rectal Examination (DRE).

Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia (PCFA) is currently working in partnership with Cancer Council Australia to develop national clinical guidelines on PSA testing and early management of test-detected prostate cancer. The guidelines are being developed using the National Health and Medical Research Council's externally developed guidelines, standards and procedures. It is expected that the guidelines will be published in late 2014.

In the meantime, PCFA retains its current advice, which is that men over the age of 50 – or 40 if they have a family history of prostate cancer – should talk to their doctor about testing for prostate cancer, using the PSA test and DRE as part of their annual health check up. Men should make an individual informed decision about testing based on the latest available evidence on the benefits and potential harms of testing and subsequent treatment for prostate cancer.

Understanding the trials of other people's cancer journey

There are some critical factors to take into consideration: tumours, prostate, local, personal and institutional factors, and such aspects as where you live, family history, a friend's experience, complications, finances, the cost of treatment, and how much time off work each person can take for their particular treatment.

Several case studies were also highlighted. This is all very important information for anyone faced with the sometimes daunting task of choosing a treatment option that is best for them. Having a copy of this DVD can provide significant help.

NEW TEST IN ADDITION TO THE PSA TEST

FOR those who did not read it in *The Advertiser* on Wednesday August 7, News Ltd's National Health Reporter Sue Dunlevy wrote this story, under the heading Cost Hits Prostate Test.

"A new Prostate Cancer test that is 36 per cent better at picking which men are at risk of Cancer is now available, but is not funded by Medicare.

"The Prostate Health Index test combines three measures of prostate cancer risk and has an accuracy rate of 75 per cent, compared with 55 per cent accuracy of the PSA test alone.

"However, few doctors use the new test because it costs \$90, while the PSA test is free. United States urologist Dr Stacey Loebe, who took part in trials of the new PHI test, says it combines measurements of total PSA, free PSA (a form that circulates in the bloodstream) and a subcategory of free PSA called pro-PSA.

"She says research suggests that pro-PSA is more closely tied to prostate cancer than total or free PSA.

"The test was discussed at a Prostate Cancer world conference in Melbourne during early August.

"Melbourne University's Associate Professor Ken Sikaris who also works for Sonic Health Care, one of Australia's largest pathology companies, told the conference that too many men are being unnecessarily worried about prostate cancer because no clear testing schedule exists.

"Professor Sikaris says that men with a low PSA test result should be reassured and only retested every four years.

"Those with a PSA reading over 10 should see a urologist but also be retested in case the high reading is caused by an

infection or benign growth.

"Those with a PSA result of between 4 and 10 should be monitored every two years.

"If you retest every two years you won't miss out on any interim cancers," Professor Sikaris said."
